CONVERSATIONS WITH A VETERINARIAN

Colic

No one word strikes as much fear and anxiety in horse owners as this 5 letter word. Except for human moms with newborns, you never hear about this disorder in other species. However, colic is really a general term used to describe pain in the abdomen that may or may be digestive in origin (but more often than not it is digestive) and can occur in other species. So why is colic often associated with horses? To understand the reasons a quick summary of the horse's digestive tract is necessary.

The horse, unlike most domesticated herbivores, has a simple stomach (cattle, sheep, goats as ruminants have a fore gut or rumen). Unlike the rumen, simple stomachs cannot digest or start the fermentation process of the cellulose. Cellulose is contained in plant fibrous material which then provides the energy source horses need. Most of the fiber digestion occurs in the latter part of the intestines (large intestine, colon, cecum); hence, horses are considered hind gut fermenters (the rabbit is also a hind gut fermenter and so think of your horse as a miniature rabbit). The majority of your horse's energy needs are met through bacterial fermentation in the large intestine which is the largest and most complex of all the domesticated farm animals. Herbivores are best suited to digest and utilize forage and grasses through the action of bacteria and for the horse this is in the large intestine. In ruminants, this process occurs in the rumen-so you can see horses are somewhat backwards in their capability and efficiency to digest plant material --horses are about 70% efficient in this capability compared to cattle. In comparison, the stomach is relatively small (capacity 2 ½-5 gallons) with the entire digestive tract having a capacity of about 25-50 gallons. Anatomically, the large intestine has several "flexures" in which feed material must traverse and some areas are particularly prone to gas production (cecum) or impaction (colon). When you consider these anatomical and physiological differences, combined with the added stress of work performance and feedings of concentrated processed grains, it's a wonder they don't often have colic.

As we know, colic is probably the most common farm call visit we face as horse owners (right there with lameness issues). Depending on the origin of the problem, symptoms, diagnosis, and treatment, the prognosis will vary. For example, colic can be described as spasmodic, impaction or flatulent. Spasmodic colic (very dramatic) is associated with a high amount of intestinal fluid and gas sounds and symptomatically has sudden bursts of pain. Impacted colic is usually of a low to moderate level of pain. Colic can also be associated with torsions or displacements but in most cases are of the spasmodic or impaction in nature. Colics originating in the small intestine are usually acute (< 12 hrs) and manifest as severe pain, while large intestinal colics are slower onset (36 hrs), demonstrate less pain but can be severe if allowed to progress. Abdominal disorders causing colic can be numerous and include hernia's, intussusceptions, obstructions, inflammatory lesions, ascarid impactions, volvulus, infarctions and ulcers to mention only a few GI origins. Nondigestive causes of colic can be renal (e.g. calculi build up) or reproductive (e.g. parturition) in origin.

Stomach and small intestinal disorders often require surgical intervention while large intestinal disorders most often (but not always) respond to medical treatments. Impactions of the large intestine usual occur in areas of the "pelvic flexure" causing gradual onset of mild to moderate pain. Your veterinarian will be able to localize through examination, history and clinical signs better and can treat effectively. Treatment is tailored to ensure: 1. Resolve the problem (e.g. laxative or mineral oil to aid passage of food material, surgery to resolve an obstruction etc), 2. Manage pain and 3. Maintain normal hydration status (IV fluids as needed) and reestablish normal digestion. Remember that prevention and understanding the causes of colic can play a very important role in managing and hopefully preventing colic from occurring. Watch for changes in the weather/season (particularly now and in the spring), diet and health status of your horse carefully. Finally, just remember to enjoy your upcoming holiday feasts but don't overeat yourselves lest you get colic.

Hassler Dressage at Riversedge Chesapeake City, MD will be hosting the 2010 Region One Adult Clinic on May 8-9, 2010. The clinic is open to all riders ages 22 and older who are members of USDF. Each rider has a 30-45 minute private session in a symposium style format. The cost to the rider is \$250.00 for each day of the clinic. To download information and forms on submitting an application and requirements for DVD/VHS submission, go to USDF website. The clinic is open to a wide range of horses and riders. This means that you do not have to ride a "Warmblood" to be chosen and you do not have to be a professional rider. There will be a lecture which is open to all riders and auditors and will include a notebook. The opportunity to audit this clinic is available to everyone. USDF members get a discount. Members fees to audit are \$40.00 for one day and \$70.00 for the weekend. Nonmembers audit fees are \$45.00 for one day and \$80.00 for the weekend. Preregistration is strongly encouraged. If interested, obtain forms from USDF website and register prior to deadline.. All preregistrations will receive email confirmations. Walk-ins will be accepted the day of the clinic. Plan on arriving at least a1/2 hour prior to the start of the clinic. Fees for walk-ins are \$50.00 for one day and \$90.00 for the weekend.

Charlotte Bredahl-Baker's Biography

Charlotte Bredahl-Baker was born and raised in Denmark. In 1979, she moved to the United States, where she has been training dressage horses ever since. In 1985 Charlotte earned her dressage judge's license. Today, Charlotte is a USEF "S" judge and FEI "C" judge.

Charlotte has represented the United States in many international dressage competitions and spent three summers training and competing in Europe. In 1997, she and her other horse, Lugano, were part of the silver medal winning United States team at the North American Championship in Maryland.

In 2004, Charlotte's stallion, Windfall CB was named USDF Horse of the Year at Intermediaire I. In 2005, Charlotte and Eskada won CDS and USDF regional Championships at Prix St. George and Intermediaire I Freestyle. In the same year, Charlotte and Komo won CDS and USDF regional Championships at Grand Prix and Grand Prix Freestyle. In 2006, when competing in Florida, both Eskada and Komo qualified in the top 12 for Gladstone in Intermediaire I and Grand Prix, respectively.

Charlotte lives in the beautiful Santa Ynez Valley, where in addition to training and teaching dressage she works in real estate. Charlotte is married to Polo player and financial adviser, Joel Baker. They have an eighteen year old son named Zachary and three dogs: Bandit, a German Shepherd, Rocko, a Chow-mix, and Josephine, a Lab.

Besides dressage, Charlotte enjoys tennis, ballroom dancing and mentoring children.

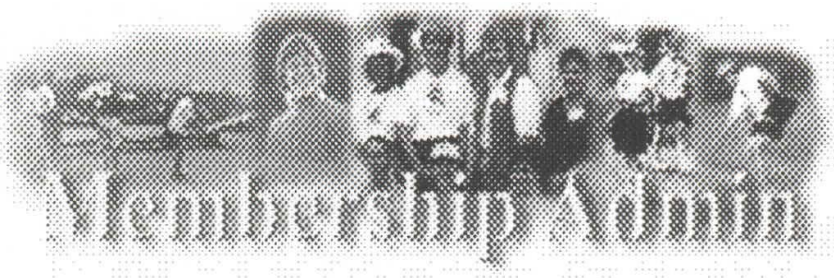
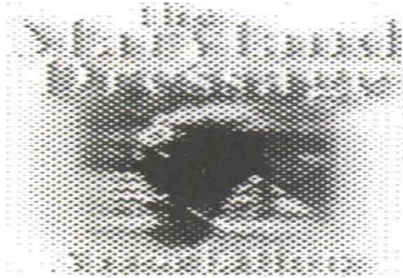

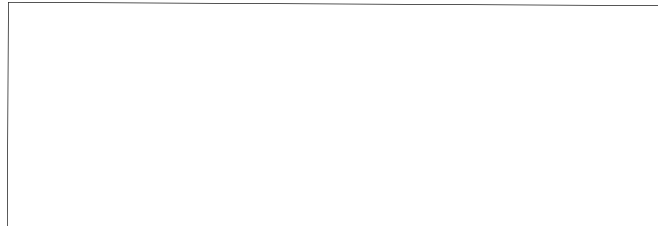
